

Organ Donation

At the time of death, you may be asked about organ donation. If you do not know the wishes of your loved one, the following may be helpful as you give consideration to your decision.

The decision to donate organs is a personal one. There is no church law or theological reason preventing Lutheran Christians from choosing to be organ donors. Lutheran theology and confession affirm the resurrection of the body. God's promise to resurrect the body is not compromised by organ donation.

After organ donation, you may receive notification that your loved ones organs were used. Please be aware that this notification may come without warning.

Autopsy

An autopsy may be required by a physician or medical examiner. An autopsy should be considered when the cause of death is uncertain. If a doctor does not order an autopsy, you may be billed. You may request a copy of the autopsy report.

The Obituary

When preparing the information for the obituary, you might consider the following:

- 1. Will a picture appear with the obituary? There is a fee. Your funeral director will have price information. You may be billed directly by the newspaper. Some funeral homes include the cost in their bill to you instead.
- Are there newspapers, other than the local paper, in which you would like the obituary to appear? (These might include the newspapers in your hometown, or other areas where you may have lived, and where people would like to be aware of this information.)
 What interesting and/or personal information will you include? (See preceding pages)
 Some people prefer to make a gift in loving memory of the deceased to a favorite or designated charity. Will you designate a favorite charity to receive memorial gifts?

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Grave Markers

The inscription on the grave marker can be as simple or as detailed as you desire. Pictures, emblems, or other details can be added to make the marker personal and to reflect something of the individual's life. You may purchase a grave marker at any time, even months after the service.
